THE CONCEPT

The Innovating Justice Forum 2020 focuses on Financing Justice Innovation. Demand for effective justice services from people is huge. But investment in such services is still minimal. What needs to be done to increase the money streams towards preventing and resolving justice problems?

Innovators, investors, donors and finance experts from ministries and courts will meet to explore these issues. HiiL informs their dialogue with data and research. As always, the HiiL Innovating Justice Forum is the place where perspectives on user friendly justice meet: bottom up and institutional; justice entrepreneurs and courts; informal and formal justice; innovation and research; UN inspired movements next to innovation Hubs in Lagos, Nairobi, Johannesburg, Kampala, Tunis, The Hague and Kyiv; and transformation in Abuja, Bamako and Beirut.

The purpose of the forum is to:

1. Get a bird's eye view of the needs for financing justice

The justice gap has been defined by landmark reports during 2019. What are the investable opportunities that have potential to bridge the justice gap? What scale of investments is needed, how do we get that investment and how can we make that sustained? In relation to that, how can we connect the current silos and build a group of engaged actors from different sectors.

2. Understand the dynamics of current financial streams in the justice sector

How are government budgets for justice managed? How do institutions compete for the budget of the ministry of justice? What do private investors and funders need? How can revenues be increased so more people can be served and the sector can grow?

3. Explore the best innovations and how revenues can be increased

Other sectors, such as health, solar and water, are already making the transition to 100% access. They managed to increase revenues, also by increasing contributions from beneficiaries. What 'smart fee systems' are available for the justice sector? Which business models work for justice innovation? What do we know about ability to pay? What is the right balance between public and private payments?

4. Define measurable outcomes to make the case for investment

What does actually change in people's lives when justice is done: health, sustainable livelihoods, risks to the human environment? How does a fair solution look like and how can it be measured? Social impact investors want to see measurable outcomes, and have to be convinced that justice outcomes are at least as valuable as education or healthcare outcomes. Investors are more likely to invest in standardised services that can be monitored and scaled. Users of the justice system are more likely to pay fees for tangible benefits. Government agencies need to monitor quality. So defining outcomes, which is notoriously difficult when related to justice, seems to be a key step towards increased revenues and budgets.

5. Budgeting and public/private partnerships to finance 100% access to justice

Analysis by experts suggests that stakeholders have to cooperate to increase the money flowing for justice:

- Citizens want better services, for which they are willing to pay.
- Current public services feel the constraints of limited budgets.
- Private investors need a perspective for growth.
- Innovators need access to scale for their services.
- Governments need to make space for innovative services, in courts and in the legal services markets, but also need help to monitor quality.

How can this happen in a coordinated way, opening the sector up to growth and delivering 100% access to justice? Which pilot programmes can be designed?
